One of the particular joys of my role is the opportunity to consistently move forward, delivering an education in dance and beyond that responds to our students' evolving needs and the high demands set by the professional world.

It has therefore been the utmost privilege to lead the School through an exciting year, with key developments in our healthcare, choreographic and academic programmes, and international success for our graduates.

Our final year students inspired us once again as they left to join the Royal Ballet companies and other top international companies. We were delighted that six students joined The Royal Ballet's Aud Jebsen Young Dancers Programme and Birmingham Royal Ballet, with a further 15 finding positions in prestigious companies around the world.

Before their departure, we celebrated their time at the School with four sold-out performances at Opera Holland Park, this year dedicated to Jay Jolley's long service to the School. Jay, our former Acting Artistic Director, Assistant Artistic Director and ballet teacher, retired this year after 24 years at the School, and his enthusiasm and commitment will be sorely missed. The students also took to the main stage of the Royal Opera House in a matinee performance given in honour of David Bintley CBE, stepping down as Director of Birmingham Royal Ballet after almost 25 years of inspiring leadership. Ballets presented at the Summer Performances included *Paquita* by Marius Petipa, La Valse by Frederick Ashton, Simple Symphony by Alastair Marriott and Scottish Dances from Bintley's own *Flowers of the Forest.* My sincere thanks to our sponsors and in particular Imagination for their continued support of the School and these performances.

The year brought some significant developments in the School's choreographic training. Our three annual choreographic competitions have been transformed into Emerging Choreographer programmes, allowing several students

It has been truly rewarding to watch students' creative expression blossom under the mentorship and encouragement of experienced practitioners.

At Upper School, the first cohort of students studying for The Royal Ballet School degree in Classical Ballet and Dance Performance continued to progress towards graduation in 2020, while those students who completed A Levels achieved an impressive 100% pass rate. Our belief in the importance of a balanced and holistic education was further supported by outstanding GCSE results at White Lodge, with 60% of results at grades 9-7 (A*/A), against a national average of 20.6%.

Our pioneering Healthy Dancer Programme continues to lead the way in dance healthcare, enhancing our students' performance and substantially reducing injury through the support and research of our 20-strong in-house healthcare team. It has been heartening to see students becoming empowered to take charge of their own wellbeing from the age of 11 onwards, laying the foundations for a sustained and healthy career. I am proud to say that promoting positive mental health has continued to be a focus, and this year we appointed a clinical psychologist to the healthcare team. A film showcasing the Healthy Dancer Programme was launched in 2019, demonstrating our world-leading commitment to creating strong, resilient young dancers.

This programme and so many others this year have been enabled and championed by our Chairman, the Duchess of Wellington OBE, who completed her final full year leading the School's governing body. Following a remarkable and



successful decade in the role, the Duchess will leave an unforgettable and lasting legacy. The year to come will provide an opportunity to look ahead to the tenure of our new Chairman, esteemed businessman Christopher Rodrigues CBE, and to formally express our gratitude to the Duchess for her selfless and dedicated leadership.

I also wish to thank, as always, the Board of Governors, our community of staff and volunteers, and our generous supporters, who help to make our students' extraordinary achievements possible.

Report by the trustees on the Summarised Financial Statements

The above summarised financial statements are extracted from the full statutory Governors' annual report and financial statements which were approved by the Governors and signed on their behalf on 17 July 2020. The full financial statements, on which the auditors Crowe UK LLP gave an unqualified audit report, have been submitted to the Charity Commission and the Registrar of Companies.

The auditors have confirmed to the Governors that, in their opinion, the summarised financial statements are consistent with the full financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2019.


